Live meeting online. We will email the Zoom link with your registration confirmation.

Live in-person and on Zoom. If you choose Zoom, we will email the Zoom link with your registration confirmation.

How to prepare to use Zoom

Where do I find the Zoom link for my course?

- A registration confirmation will be emailed to you after you pay for your course. This email will contain the Zoom link. Remember to make note of this email and create a folder in your inbox labeled "OLLI Zoom" and save it.
- A course reminder will be emailed to you four days prior to the start date of the course. This email will also contain the Zoom link. Again, make note and save it.
- 3) Login to your OLLI account. Click on the person icon. Choose "Class List." The Zoom link will be in the "Receipt Notes."

What devices do I need to use Zoom?

At the most basic level, all you need to use Zoom is a telephone, such as a smartphone or landline. However, if you have access to a computer or mobile device you can use the full capabilities of Zoom. The following equipment will enhance your experience:

- Mobile devices, including laptops with cameras and built-in microphones.
- Web camera on your device: A camera will increase your connection with your instructor and your peers by allowing you to see each other face-to-face. If you do not have access to a web camera, you will still be able to see the instructor.
- Headset with a microphone: This will let you hear and be heard more clearly. This does not need to be fancy equipment; it can be the same as the headphones you might use with your phone.

How do I join a Zoom meeting?

You will receive a Zoom link for your upcoming OLLI at UNL course(s) in your registration confirmation email, and in a reminder email prior to class. Next to or underneath each class title, you will see a link. Copy and paste that link into your web browser OR click on the link to enter the digital classroom. If your course has multiple sessions, you will use the same link every week the course meets.

A Zoom account is not required to attend a class session. Anyone can attend a class session using their laptop or desktop (Windows or Mac), tablet, or smartphone (iPhone or Android). A free download of Zoom is available in your app store for your device.

- If you have not used Zoom before, allow about five minutes to set it up before your first use.
- If you use a laptop or desktop, the first time you click on a link it will download a free and secure program to your computer.
- If you use a tablet or smart phone, you will need to download the free and secure Zoom application from your app store.



Name, Image, Likeness: NIL and College Athletics – 1 session

Have you heard about NIL and wondered what it's all about? How has this impacted college athletes? What other developments may impact this initiative in the next several years? You will receive an overview of NIL developments in college athletics since July 2021.

The Language and Psychology of Disinformation – 6 sessions

George Ayoub, journalist and adjunct professor at Hastings College explores the various ways information consumers are deceived, the consequences of such deceptions, and the impact of disinformation on democratic principles such as voting that rely on a shared, verifiable set of facts. The class discusses the psychology behind the use of propaganda and disinformation. Learn techniques to combat the onslaught of disinformation.

Kansas Black History – 2 sessions

For a state outside of the South, a great deal of civil rights history has occurred in Kansas. Learn about this history occurring within this neighboring state through two primary topics, the first of which is the significance of the historic Supreme court decision in Brown vs. Board of Education, which involved a young Black girl who wanted to attend her neighborhood school in Topeka. Today that school is a National Historic Site. Also learn the story of Black Homesteaders who founded the town of Nicodemus, Kansas. Angela Bates, descendent of the original homesteaders talks about the history of the town which is also a National Historic Site.

The History of the Negro Baseball League – 2 sessions

Baseball was the major sport in the United States from the Civil War until well into the 20th century. For blacks, though, their baseball history stopped in 1947 when Jackie Robinson debuted with the Los Angeles Dodgers. Former Nebraska Wesleyan baseball coach Bill Fagler takes an indepth look at this fascinating period in history, including the players, teams, administrators, and events that shaped Negro League Baseball.

Mosquitoes, Ticks, and More – 2 sessions

In Nebraska, mosquitoes and ticks can thrive and carry diseases such as West Nile Virus, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and Lyme Disease. And now "kissing bugs" and the Chagas disease parasite have been found in Nebraska. Public health professionals provide an overview of these arthropods and other public health pests, their diseases, how they are transmitted, risks for contracting, and how you can protect yourself and your family from these risks.

The Bible as Literature – 6 sessions

Study the growth and development of the collection of religious texts known as "the Bible." There will be an emphasis on historical events that influence both content and context. Religion, literature, social, and political institutions are integral elements in the historical process.

Pistols at Twenty Paces: Honor and Violence Through the Ages – 6 sessions

"Sir, a man may shoot the man who invades his character, as he may shoot him who attempts to break into his house." So wrote Samuel Johnson in 1791. The theme of this course rests on the presumption implicit in Johnson's statement, namely that men (mainly) are justified in resorting to force when others impinge upon the social construction that is their public honor or reputation. We will examine the role of honor, here seen as a form of property, in understanding violent behavior among individuals, groups, and even nations from the ancient Greeks to "The Godfather."

Keep the Memories, Not the Stuff – 3 sessions

Our attachment to "stuff" is real. Letting go can be difficult. Yet, holding onto too much stuff can be suffocating or immobilizing, preventing us from living our best life because we are too weighed down by our possessions. Learn the problem of "inherited stuff" as well as our own "keepsake clutter." Get a new perspective on memories, life, and love – and how none of it is tied to STUFF. Learn hands-on tips and practical advice for choosing which possessions to keep, to get rid of, and what it really means to leave a legacy for your loved ones.

Saving a Life with CPR



H&W008L

Learn the lifesaving skills of Adult Hands-Only CPR, Child CPR, Infant CPR and AED use. We will cover mild and severe airway blocks for adults, children and infants. Skills are taught in a dynamic group environment using the American Heart Association's researchproven practice, while watching technique. Also learn the use of life-saving tourniquets in controlling serious extremity hemorrhage. This course is information only and does not lead to re-certification in cardiopulmonary resuscitation.



Learning from Nebraska's "Never Event"



History unexamined may become history repeated. This simple premise and a desire to save lives led to the true story of one of America's largest outbreaks of Hepatitis C resulting from healthcare transmission in the book "A Never Event: Exposing the Largest Outbreak of Hepatitis C in American Healthcare History." The event took place in Nebraska in 2002. The book is written by a survivor and an attorney who represented 19 of the victims. They will lead the course.

A "Never Event" is a term used to describe a preventable medical tragedy. The book offers a searing account of the medical, legal and emotional challenges of the outbreak. The presenters will lead a discussion about the lessons learned from the many tragedies that resulted.



Postponed, Cancelled or Full Courses

If a class is postponed, you will be informed of the rescheduled date. If a course is cancelled or full, you will receive notice as soon as possible. You will be the following options:

- Add your name to a wait list
- Register for an alternate course
- Receive a refund
- Donate your course fee

Weather-Related Cancellations

If Lincoln Public Schools or UNL is closed or starts late due to weather conditions, OLLI in-person and multi-format courses and events will be canceled. OLLI weekend in-person courses and events are canceled if UNL cancels courses or closes. Zoom only courses may take place.
